

Giving up my iPod for a Walkman



1 When the Sony Walkman was launched, 30 years ago this week, it started a revolution in portable music. But how does it compare with its digital successors? The Magazine invited 13-year-old Scott Campbell to swap his iPod for a Walkman for a week.

My dad had told me it was the iPod of its day.

5 He had told me it was big, but I hadn't realised he meant THAT big. It was the size of a small book.

When I saw it for the first time, its colour also struck me. Nowadays gadgets come in a rainbow of colours but this was only one shade – a bland grey.

From a practical point of view, the Walkman is rather cumbersome, and it is certainly not pocket-sized, unless you have large pockets. It comes with a handy belt clip screwed onto the back, yet the weight of the unit is enough to pull down your trousers.

When I went out with my Walkman, I got strange looks, a mixture of surprise and curiosity, that made me a little embarrassed.


As I boarded the school bus, I was greeted with laughter. One boy said: "No-one uses them any more." Another said: "Groovy." Yet another one joked: "That would be hard to lose."

My friends couldn't imagine their parents using this monstrous box, but there was interest in what the thing was and how it worked.

Throughout my week using the Walkman, I came to realise that I have very little knowledge of technology from the past.

You can almost imagine the excitement about the Walkman coming out 30 years ago, as it was the newest piece of technology at the time.

Perhaps that kind of anticipation and excitement has been somewhat lost in the flood of new products which now hit our shelves on a regular basis.

Personally, I'm relieved I live in the digital age, with bigger choice, more functions and smaller devices. I'm relieved that the majority of technological advancement happened before I was born, as I can't imagine having to use such basic equipment every day.

30 Having said all that, it's better than having no music.

Now, for technically curious readers, I've directly compared the portable cassette player with its latter-day successor. Here are the main cons, and even some pros I found with this piece of antique technology.

SOUND

When playing, it is clearly evident that the music sounds significantly different than when played on an MP3 player, mainly because of the hissy backtrack and strange warbling noises on the Walkman.

The warbling is probably because of the horrifically short battery life; it is nearly completely dead within three hours of firing it up.

CONVENIENCE

Let's face it, the Walkman is big. There were a number of buttons protruding from the top and sides of this device to provide functions such as "rewinding" and "fast-forwarding" (remember those?), which added even more bulk.

As well as this, the need for changing cassettes is bothersome in itself. The cassettes which I had could only hold around 12 tracks each, a fraction of the capacity of the smallest iPod.

But it's not all a one-way street when you line up a Walkman against an iPod. The Walkman actually has two headphone sockets, labelled A and B, meaning the little music that I have, I can share with friends. To plug two pairs of headphones into an iPod, you have to buy a special adapter.

Another useful feature is the power socket on the side, so that you can plug the Walkman into the wall when you're not on the move. But given the dreadful battery life, I guess this was an outright necessity rather than an extra function.

[1] For parents who don't trust their kids or who want a little more in home security, the Sleuth Camera is a great gadget to have around. It's highly doubtful that anyone would suspect that this plain black tissue box would have a hidden camera inside.

[2] It can record during the day as well as at night. It can also be set up to begin recording at scheduled times, so that you don't have to keep it running at all times and can save battery life. If anyone were to pick up the entire device, they might notice something a bit different about it. For those that never touch it though, there wouldn't be any issues. It has a hidden SD card slot underneath and a hidden rechargeable 6-hour battery. You can pick this up through Brickhouse for US\$599.95, which might be a bit pricey for the average household.

[3] In today's society, lunch meals often consist of fast foods or a soda and chocolate bar from the snack vending
 machine just because the demands of work limit the amount of time people have at lunchtime.

[4] If this sounds like you, Heinz has created the world's smallest microwave oven known as the Beanzawave. Not only does this small microwave easily fit on your office desk, but get this, it's USB powered.

[5] Office workers no longer have an excuse to miss their lunch because of their busy work schedule. Even students preparing for their exams or finishing their school assignments can enjoy a warm snack or hot drink without losing their train of thought.

[6] Currently, the Beanzawave is a prototype model, but scientists at Heinz insist the sophisticated technology does exist to turn the eye-catching gadget into a reality. Although the Beanzawave is USB powered, it can optionally use lithium ion batteries making it a truly portable microwave that can be taken on camping or fishing trips.

20 [7] This microwave is also fast cooking. It is said that it can cook some foods in under a minute. It is expected that once the Beanzawave enters the retail market, it will retail for about only US\$160.

[8] If you're one of those people that suffers from unusual sleep patterns and you want to get your body back in check, you might be able to do it with this acupuncture sleeping gadget, the Dreamate.

[9] Dreamate uses acupressure techniques to gently massage the "sleeping golden triangle" on your left wrist. These precise pressure points, when gently massaged, lower stress levels. This calms the body and induces sleep. I've no idea how effective this is but it sounds kind of cool. Used 30 minutes before bedtime, you can retune and reset your biological clock and train your body to relax and sleep. See results in as little as a week's worth of use, with best results after eight weeks. The Dreamate is available from Slumbercadia for US\$79.99.

[10] In certain countries, you aren't allowed to keep dogs if you're living in an apartment. One of the reasons is the apartment is not exactly the best place for a pooch to roam around, and if the dog doesn't learn to stop its barking, it could end up annoying the neighbors. Why not train your four-legged friend to stay quiet with this gadget?

[11] This patented device quickly and humanely restores peace and quiet to a home. No special collar is required; when a dog barks within 25 feet of the unit, it emits a harmless ultrasonic tone, inaudible to humans, that startles the animal into silence. The dog quickly associates its bark with the unpleasant sound, which conditions him to curb this undesirable behavior. You can also activate the unit yourself to help correct a dog's other bad habits, such as lying on furniture or foraging through the trash.
